Mayor Rojas called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m., and led the Pledge of Allegiance. Councilman Lopez led the Invocation.

ITEM #04 – ROLL CALL – All members of the Council were present, except for Vice-Mayor Patino, who was excused.

ITEM #05 – CALL TO THE AUDIENCE

Mr. Luttrell: As you know, this is the first that this agenda is available to me. And you have Item #07 coming up, which is ...

Mayor Rojas: Excuse me.

Ms. Moreno: Excuse me. Can we get your name and address just for the record? I know ...

Mr. Luttrell: Sure.

Ms. Moreno: ... who you are, but I just want to make sure ...

Mayor Rojas: That the, ...

Ms. Moreno: ... (inaudible).

Mayor Rojas: ... the record has to ...

Mr. Luttrell: Dennis Luttrell. And the address is 305 East Benson Highway.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Thank you.

Ms. Moreno: Thank you.

Mr. Luttrell: And it looks like it's a big concern to me, it's something that I'd be concerned about. But I believe it used to be, and I, that the agendas were published on whenever something was published on the web and also notice published on the web. Notice is published but there is no, there is no, nothing on there for action items or the agenda. And, and like I said, like I would like to see what deal the, inside of spending all your time talking about this, like if the ordinance was made available to us so we'd be prepared on your meetings here.

Mayor Rojas: I would just like to know what are you talking about?

Mr. Luttrell: I'm talking about Item #07.

Mayor Rojas: Item #07. Okay. Ordinance No. 16-05?

Mr. Luttrell: Yes.

Mayor Rojas: Yeah, okay, sure.

Mr. Luttrell: Yeah, or make actual, make that available to us so that we can respond to it.

Mayor Rojas: Alright. Sure will.

Mr. Luttrell: Thank you.

Mayor Rojas: No problem. Thank you very much. Anybody else? Yes.

Ms. Rogers: Rita Rogers, 305 East Benson Highway. This is my biggest concern. If we could figure this out some way. In the past, I'm going to go all the way back to Dan Eckstrom. Back, all the way back. (Inaudible) we've been here 25 years and we, according to the open meeting laws, were able to read the agenda to see if we would attend or not attend. And it was always in the glass case out here. So every week when I asked Dennis what's on the agenda, we can't find out until we show up. So everything, really, since I've been on school board 9 years, open meeting law, every vote doesn't count because we never knew what you were putting on. So I would like that addressed.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Thank you very much. Anybody else? None noted.

ITEM #06 – APPROVAL OF MINUTES – None available.

ITEM #07 – ORDINANCE NO. 16-05 OF THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON, PIMA COUNTY, ARIZONA, CREATING, AMENDING, AND ADOPTING REVISIONS TO THE CITY CODE CHAPTER

11, ARTICLE II SS11-36, BUSINESS PRIVILEGE LICENSES AND ARTICLE III RENTAL OCCUPANCY TAX, BY REFERENCE

Ms. Aguirre: Mayor, members of the Council, what you have in front of you are basically three areas of Chapter 11 which need to be repealed. You may recall a couple of weeks ago I mentioned to you all that we would begin the process of codifying the City Code, seeing what areas the City Code needed to be amended or revised to be in accordance with State statutes, and so these are three areas addressed here in this ordinance that need to be changed. So ...

Mayor Rojas: And this will keep us in line with the A.R.S. with Arizona Revised Statutes. That's the reason for that. Am I correct?

Ms. Aguirre: Yes, that is correct. The statutes are actually referenced in the ordinance, the body, as the A.R.S. 9-491, A.R.S. 9-1304, and A.R.S. 9-500.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Questions?

Councilman Green: I have a question in regards to the two Call to the Audience.

Mayor Rojas: Councilman Green.

Councilman Green: I think I had said this in the past and to, if we were to do these in a timely manner or, and I understand, you know, that getting back to on point, if we can get this in a manner or a time that we don't have to wait like Friday afternoon, or Friday evening, because if I come in and I have, you know, I'm working Fridays, and Saturday, and Sundays, I still have to try to make time to come in here to do it. And to actually sit back and this, this isn't only in this agenda item. I'm saying every agenda from now on. If we can say this Monday is a deadline for the meeting two weeks down the road. Because the, the Monday today, you should be giving me the agenda for next Monday, if we're having a meeting. You should give us, as a Council, at least six to seven days and not only that, if you give it to us and you publish it on the system, individuals like Dennis and, you know, others, may look at it. Is that, is that a problem?

Ms. Moreno: Mayor and Councilman Green, that is not a problem that can be achieved. However, sometimes for timeliness certain agenda items, you know, (inaudible) ask Mayor and Council to work with us on those items, but you know, we only have so many people on board here that are working on multiple items so, but we'll do our very best to keep the Council tracking along on future agenda items as much as possible. I think, for the most part, we do know what's coming in the future and anything that can be delayed for, you know, proper notification to Mayor and ...

Councilman Green: No, unless, ...

Ms. Moreno: ... Council (inaudible) ...

Councilman Green: ... unless ...

Ms. Moreno: ... (inaudible).

Councilman Green: ... it's a barn burner or something ...

Ms. Moreno: No, no, no.

Councilman Green: ... like that, then, you know, I ...

Ms. Moreno: Of course.

Councilman Green: ... can understand that. But let's say today should be the last day that anything goes off of the agenda, ...

Ms. Moreno: Right.

Councilman Green: ... you know, that is on the third weekend.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. That sounds good. Any other questions? Wishes from the Council on 16-05.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Mr. Mayor, after looking at the changes, I don't see any reason why we shouldn't approve, so motion to approve.

Motion by Councilwoman Mendoza to approve Ordinance No. 16-05. Seconded by Councilman Lopez. Motion passed unanimously.

ITEM #08- RESOLUTION NO. 16-47 OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON, ARIZONA, DECLARING AS A PUBLIC RECORD THOSE CERTAIN DOCUMENTS FILED WITH THE CITY CLERK'S OFFICE AND ENTITLED CITY CODE CHAPTER 11, PHASE 1, REVISIONS, ADOPTED PURSUANT TO ORDINANCE NO. 16-05

Mayor Rojas: This is just a, keeping it a matter of public record what we just passed. Council, your wishes on 16-47?

Motion by Councilman Green to pass Resolution No. 16-47 as it stands. Seconded by Councilman Lopez.

Unknown: Does that mean like the, when you guys ...

Mayor Rojas: Excuse me, sir.

Councilwoman Mendoza: It's not open.

Unknown: I'm sorry.

Mayor Rojas: It's not an open meeting.

Unknown: I'm sorry about that.

Mayor Rojas: You can't address us because this is items on ...

Unknown: (Inaudible) ...

Mayor Rojas: ... the agenda.

Unknown: ... question.

Mayor Rojas: You can ask the City Manager after the meeting

Unknown: Okay. I apologize.

Ms. Moreno: The questions are asked either during the Call to Audience ...

Unknown: Yeah, I've ...

Ms. Moreno: ... (inaudible) ...

Unknown: ... never been to ...

Ms. Moreno: ... (inaudible) ...

Unknown: ... one of these, so.

Ms. Moreno: ... (inaudible).

Mayor Rojas: No problem.

Ms. Moreno: Thank you.

All Council members were in favor of the motion. Motion passed unanimously.

ITEM #09 – RESOLUTION NO. 16-48 OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON, ARIZONA, RATIFYING, APPROVING, AND ADOPTING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE SOUTH TUCSON POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE ORGANIZED CRIME DRUG ENFORCEMENT TASK FORCE FOR USE OF STRIKE FORCE/STRATEGIC INITIATIVE PROGRAM FUNDS AND DIRECTING AND AUTHORIZING THE SOUTH TUCSON POLICE CHIEF TO EXECUTE THE AGREEMENT AND ACT AS THE LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCY OFFICIAL

Ms. Moreno: Thank you, Mayor, members of the Council. This has come before you in past agenda items. However, this year the City was awarded an amount from OCDETF in the amount of \$143,395. And if you can refer to the page after the resolution, it will show you what the monies are for. And it's for (inaudible) notebooks, GPS tracker, arrowhead upgrades for stingray system, the purchase of evidence and information, Samsung tablets, and the last item is (inaudible). I'm not sure

what that is. We have Finance Director and the Police Chief here to provide you with any more details regarding this award.

Ms. Aguirre: And, City Manager, if I may, members of the Council, these line items here have been requested from OCDETF from the District Office, the DEA District Office, based on their needs for their operations. And so once the money is awarded, they actually work in coordination with our police department to make sure that the purchases are made. And then the reimbursements are streamed through our Finance Department.

Councilman Green: Mr. Mayor, question.

Mayor Rojas: Yes, Councilman Green.

Councilman Green: What is OCDETF? The acronym stands for what?

Chief Ford: It stands for Organized Crime Drug Enforcement Task Force.

Councilman Green: Okay.

Mayor Rojas: Yeah, I have a question, you know what happens here. The, they need this equipment so then we request the money to buy the equipment and then the equipment goes over there to ...

Chief Ford: Yes.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Just wanted to know that. Thank you. Any other questions?

Councilman Green: Okay. What, and then they're buying what again? I'm trying to.

Councilwoman Mendoza: On this one. In the box.

Mayor Rojas: In the box. See it in the box? The last page.

Councilwoman Mendoza: No, it was only the third, fourth page.

Councilman Green: Arrowhead upgrade, which is what?

Chief Ford: The arrowhead for the stingray, it is a cell phone tracking system. So as technology is changing, they have to upgrade the system. It's kind of expensive to stay up-to-date with those technologies and that's one of the tools they use in their investigations.

Councilman Larribas: I have a question. What kind of tracking? Are they tracking our employees or is it for tracking like someone out there ...

Chief Ford: It's for the investigation of their cases. So this is criminal investigations of organized crime.

Councilman Larribas: What I'm trying to say, does it ping off the tower to locate a suspect or something like that? Is that what that's for?

Chief Ford: Yes, that one particular technology, the stingray, that's what that one does. The GPS tracker maintenance and updates, those are the ones that actually track vehicles.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Rojas: Yes.

Councilwoman Mendoza: So, Chief, the equipment that is going to be purchased, that is only for the investigation department?

Chief Ford: Yes.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Okay.

Chief Ford: That's what the ...

Councilwoman Mendoza: So that's ...

Chief Ford: ... purpose ...

Councilwoman Mendoza: ... not for ...

Chief Ford: ... is of their ...

Councilwoman Mendoza: ... the whole ...

Chief Ford: ... participation ...

Councilwoman Mendoza: ... police department.

Chief Ford: ... (inaudible) force.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Wishes of the Council on Resolution 16-48?

Motion by Councilwoman Mendoza to approve Resolution No. 16-48. Seconded by Councilman Green. Motion passed unanimously.

ITEM #10 – RESOLUTION NO. 16-49 OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON, ARIZONA, RATIFYING, APPROVING AND ADOPTING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON ACTING ON BEHALF OF THE SOUTH TUCSON POLICE DEPARTMENT AND THE ARIZONA DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY FOR THE GRANT TITLED “OPSG OVERTIME AND MILEAGE”, DIRECTING AND AUTHORIZING THE SOUTH TUCSON POLICE CHIEF TO EXECUTE THE FUNDING AGREEMENT

Ms. Aguirre: Members of the Council, I'll just cover the financial (inaudible). This is a pretty standard award. It happens from year to year. And so this year, the award was actually increased from what we had received last year to \$42,000. What this will cover is the salary and benefits tied to overtime in the amount of \$40,000, and \$2,000 towards mileage expense used in the operations as approved by the Arizona Department of Homeland Security.

Mayor Rojas: Any questions? Any discussion?

Councilman Green: Well, I do.

Mayor Rojas: Councilman Green.

Councilman Green: This is Stone Garden?

Chief Ford: (Inaudible) ...

Mayor Rojas: Kind of same ...

Councilman Green: Huh?

Chief Ford: This is operation Stone Garden, yes.

Councilman Green: Okay. And that's what I want to make sure.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Any other ...

Councilman Green: Okay. And ...

Mayor Rojas: ... questions?

Councilman Green: ... well, one thing. I have to complement the Chief because I've heard from other departments that you did an outstanding job where a lot of people lost (inaudible) under this grant because of misuse. And, I guess they, they want everybody to hold up, hold you up as a standard now.

Chief Ford: Well, actually, the, the staff, they're a big part of this because the officers who go out, ...

Mayor Rojas: (Inaudible).

Chief Ford: ... they have to turn in coordination reports ...

Mayor Rojas: Yeah.

Chief Ford: ... and the work that they do supports this mission, so the staff here really did a really good job of doing (inaudible).

Councilman Green: Thank you, staff, and yourselves ...

Mayor Rojas: Appreciate it.

Councilman Green: ... for doing it. Thank you.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Mr. Mayor, I just have one question. Possibly just the one question. So, there is no specific individual police officers that get this overtime, right? It's disbursed between multiples? There's not one or two officers that get more than everyone else? I mean I want to make sure that everyone is getting their fair share of overtime here.

Chief Ford: We work with the Finance Department because this is a reimbursement grant. So there's only so much that the City can sustain per pay period. And so, we work with Finance to make determination on how many hours we can support and then those hours are distributed over the officers who wish to work this. And the ones that do have to work it, I mean they, this isn't a cakewalk where they can go out and just kind of make extra money. They really have to do these pre-coordinated ...

Mayor Rojas: Work.

Chief Ford: ... reports that come in. They have to generate intelligence, they have to show that they're actually doing things that support this overall mission, the Stone Garden.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Okay.

Mayor Rojas: The wishes of the Council on Item #16-49, please?

Motion by Councilman Green to pass the resolution as written. Seconded by Councilwoman Mendoza. Motion passed unanimously.

ITEM #11 – RESOLUTION NO. 16-50 OF THE MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON, ARIZONA, APPROVING THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN PIMA COUNTY AND THE CITY OF SOUTH TUCSON REGARDING THE ACQUISITION OF LAND AND INSTALLATION OF PEDESTRIAN SAFETY EQUIPMENT

Ms. Moreno: Thank you, Mayor, members of the Council. The item before you is the IGA between the City of South Tucson and Pima County regarding the acquisition of land and installation of pedestrian safety equipment. And I'll call our Planning Director, Joel Gastelum, to provide you with more information on this item.

Mr. Gastelum: Mr. Mayor, members of the Council, you all may remember that probably back in January 2016 or so, we were approached by Pima County Neighborhood Reinvestment Committee, actually department at the time, regarding any potential neighborhood reinvestment (inaudible) projects we had. At that time, we notified you all that we'd be submitting a proposal to acquire land, specifically, the Chevron parcels at 7th and 35th Street for an additional parcel to be included in the El Paso Southwest and Greenway Project. Now this project is for three parcels right along that area that

belong to Chevron currently. And I'll pass out some maps so you guys can get a good visual. This land is just directly adjacent to the Greenway and it will eventually be a small (inaudible). This was identified in the Greenway Master Plan that was done in about '06 as a potential park site. And it's always been just an issue of trying to find the funding to actually make it happen. And we're very lucky that we came across this funding, submitted it, and eventually the Pima County Board of Supervisors approved this project as this use. Now there's also some additional funding in there. We're proposing to do two signal lights crossings at 10th Avenue, pedestrian crossings. Again, depending on the overall land acquisition and what the overall cost of some of those signal lights crossings are going to be, there may be one to two. One is going to be probably at the northern part across 40th Street, right at our most southern boundary, as it crosses at Julian Wash area. It's kind of already an identified crossing. And then also down on, more than likely 27th and 10th Avenue, in that general area. So, at this time, it's just for the land acquisition. The County will eventually own the land. It will be their land. Eventually, again, this is just for acquisition. But there will be different designs (inaudible) open houses that we'll have in the community regarding this project, as the El Paso Southwest Greenway has.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. I think, any questions, comments?

Councilman Green: Didn't we used to own this property?

Mr. Gastelum: No, we did not. It's ...

Councilman Green: Or was ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... (inaudible).

Councilman Green: ... it the one adjacent to the south of it?

Mr. Gastelum: There's one at 36th Street ...

Councilman Green: The one that we ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... that's ...

Councilman Green: ... transferred over the two properties that became the pocket parks.

Mr. Gastelum: That's something different. There's a pocket park we have on 5th Avenue. Now there's a separate ...

Councilman Green: (Inaudible).

Mr. Gastelum: ... (inaudible) park that the County has. But this particular parcel has always been owned by Chevron.

Councilman Green: Okay. What about the one that is just south, south of it? Where you're on the corner of 36th and 8th.

Mr. Gastelum: Got you. That's a ...

Councilman Green: You have ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... vacant parcel on ...

Councilman Green: Vacant ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... (inaudible).

Councilman Green: ... parcel. Then you have the old house right here. Then those two new houses where the one that goes probably ...

Mayor Rojas: Perpendicular.

Councilman Green: ... southeast and southwest. ...

Mr. Gastelum: Yeah.

Councilman Green: ... northwest.

Mr. Gastelum: So this particular lot, this vacant one, this is still owned by the City of South Tucson.

Councilman Green: Right.

Mr. Gastelum: So this one is still City owned. The rest, those are not under our ownership. They're not City ownership.

Councilman Green: No, but they used to be?

Mr. Gastelum: They may have but ...

Councilman Green: Okay.

Mr. Gastelum: ... for quite some time, they have not.

Councilman Green: Yeah, and I think those are the ones that we, okay, I was thinking that we traded those ...

Mayor Rojas: Okay.

Councilman Green: ... again for the pocket (inaudible).

Mayor Rojas: Any other questions or comments? I think if nobody else, I think at one time I suggested 26th Street because that's an area there that's traveled a lot by the kids that go to Ochoa.

Mr. Gastelum: No problem. We're definitely, when we, goes down to doing it, actually the County's helping us out. The real estate division is working on the property acquisition.

Mayor Rojas: Okay.

Mr. Gastelum: When it comes down to some of the other things as far as design and working with some of the transportation engineers, so we'll definitely look at 26th Street (inaudible).

Mayor Rojas: Okay.

Councilman Green: And the other properties that they're looking at taking, like the one you just mentioned on 26th Street and 10th, how big of a parcel is that? I don't see it.

Mr. Gastelum: Those are just crossings. Those are just ...

Mayor Rojas: It's just, just ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... roadway ...

Mayor Rojas: ... crossing. The, ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... crossings. They ...

Mayor Rojas: ... they're just ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... (inaudible) ...

Mayor Rojas: ... like a pelican.

Mr. Gastelum: ... or anything like that.

Councilman Green: Oh, they're not taking land for, ...

Mr. Gastelum: No, ...

Councilman Green: ... they're just ...

Mr. Gastelum: ... (inaudible).

Councilman Green: ... installing.

Mr. Gastelum: Yeah. Strictly signalized pedestrian crossings.

Mayor Rojas: Pelican crossing.

Councilman Green: So, we're taking, they're just looking at the piece of property between 7th and 8th on 35th?

Mr. Gastelum: Correct.

Mayor Rojas: Okay. Item #11, what is the wishes of the Council, Resolution No. 16-50?

Motion by Councilman Lopez to approve Resolution No. 16-50.

Councilman Green: Mr. Mayor.

Mayor Rojas: Yes, Councilman Green.

Councilman Green: Is this, I mean is this going to be quit deeded to them or how are they getting it or, I mean there's so many more questions that ...

Mr. Gastelum: Sure. There's some more language in the attached IGA that we have. It's been looked at their attorneys as well, but as far as it's going to work is it's basically not going to be coming into our hands at all. The real estate division with Pima County is going to be doing all oversight and property transactions. So it's basically, the money is being allocated to the City of South Tucson. However, it's never going to come into our hands, pretty much. It's always going to remain titled with Pima County.

Councilman Green: Okay. And they're buying it directly through or from Chevron?

Mr. Gastelum: Directly working with Chevron. Correct.

Councilman Green: Okay.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Are we, Mr. Mayor, are we responsible, like you're saying it's going to be a park.

Mr. Gastelum: Correct.

Councilwoman Mendoza: So are we responsible for the maintenance ...

Mayor Rojas: No.

Councilwoman Mendoza: ... on that park?

Mr. Gastelum: So, so at this point, currently is all this IGA is strictly dealing with is acquisition so we're not talking maintenance, but to answer your question, the reason we want is, is you may remember with the El Paso, the raised actual pathway work with them to get the ownership, we're working with them in this same manner because we do not want that maintenance burden on City's staff. So it will, that's why Pima County is having ownership. They will maintain it. They will kind of work on, you know, irrigation goes bad, their crews will be out there fixing it.

Councilwoman Mendoza: And what about safety? Is it going to be locked? Are we responsible for that? Is our police department responsible for maintaining and locking that like they are our parks?

Mr. Gastelum: At this point, it has not been designed. That's the reason for some of these open houses but more than likely, I don't envision it being locked, a locked type of park. I'm envisioning it being an open park. Just, you know, to have free access. I don't envision something like (inaudible).

Councilwoman Mendoza: Not like gated (inaudible) ...

Mr. Gastelum: (Inaudible).

Councilwoman Mendoza: ... like ours are?

Mr. Gastelum: No.

Councilwoman Mendoza: Okay.

Mayor Rojas: I need a second on that motion. Councilman Lopez made the motion. I need a second so we can vote.

Seconded by Councilwoman Mendoza. Motion passed unanimously.

ITEM #12 - REPORTS

Finance Update

Ms. Aguirre: Here, briefly, I'm just going to hand out some financial reports that I have placed in your boxes at the end of October. And this covers the first quarter of the fiscal year; July, August, and September. It gives you an idea of where we're at. And then I've attached another graph or summary in the back, just to let you know that 25% of the fiscal year has lapsed. And so revenues have come in at 22.1% of the entire budget. Overall expenditures came in at the end of that quarter at 20.6. So, expenditures were tracking below revenues for the first quarter. And just to give you a little visual, I've prepared this chart right here so you guys can visualize how the trend flows for sales tax revenues. I've included data for fiscal '15, '16, and '17 by quarter. You can see quarter one was pretty close to last year same time. And there where you see some increases around fiscal 2015 quarter two, from quarter two to quarter three that's when the sales tax increase went through back in fiscal '15. And so, for this fiscal year, anticipate there being another increase in quarter two with the new changes in increases that were passed during the budget cycle. So that's what we'll be tracking along to see how (inaudible).

Mayor Rojas: Okay. So we would ordinarily be at 25% expenditure if we were going quarter to quarter.

Ms. Aguirre: That is correct, Mayor.

Mayor Rojas: Thank you. Any other questions?

Ms. Aguirre: I would also like to mention that if anybody has any questions on any specific departments, line items, feel free to swing by my office. Let me know, I can always make that detailed information available.

Mayor Rojas: Thank you very much. City Manager, any reports? None?

Ms. Moreno: (Inaudible) thank you.

Mayor Rojas: Mr. Legal Counsel? No, no?
